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
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What Can We Learn About Animals?








Nonliving things do not need anything.






Animals need food and water. Some animals find food and water. People give pets food and water.




Animals need shelter.

Responding

Sort Animals

Provide children with nature magazines. Have children cut out pictures of ten animals. Then have them sort the animals into groups of their choosing. Ask children to tell a partner how they sorted the animals.
