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
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






It is day when we wake up.






We can see the sun and clouds.

Responding

Identify the Day and Night Pattern

Have children act out the pattern of day and night. For example, you may have a group of three children with one being the sun, one being the moon, and one being himself or herself. The sun moves across the sky to represent morning, noon, and late afternoon. The child does activities appropriate for each time. Then the sun sets and the moon is visible. The child acts out going to bed. Make sure to have the pattern repeat.

Draw the Sky

Ask children to look at the sky. Remind them not to look directly at the sun. Then have children draw the day sky that they saw. Ask partners to take turns describing what they saw. Encourage children to view the night sky at home. Have them draw a picture of the night sky and share it with the rest of the class.
